

Reflection

Third Sunday After Epiphany
Jn 3:1-16

Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit." (John 3:5)

As we continue to celebrate Jesus's immense mercy in going down to the Jordan to be baptized this Epiphany season, we hear in today's Gospel an interesting exchange about the very same Mystery of baptism Jesus has given to the world for eternal life and the remission of sin. Nicodemus, one of the Jewish leaders in Jerusalem, is confused when Christ tells him that only someone born again can enter heaven (John 3:3). Nicodemus wonders how someone can be born a second time, but Christ is referring to a second birth through baptism.

Appropriately, this reading is the Gospel read at every baptism in the Maronite Church. Baptism is not just a ceremony but, as St. Paul says, we die with Christ in baptism that, through Him, we may also be raised to new life as He was (Rom. 6:4). This is why the Maronite baptismal ritual calls the waters of baptism "a new womb which gives birth to spiritual children" and why baptism in the East was always done by immersion – plunging under the water is a symbol of entering into the tomb of Christ, dying to this world, and rising out of the water we rise to new life.

Jesus Christ, Life Himself, united His divine nature to our weak human nature and subjected Himself to death and resurrection that we too may have the eternal life of His divinity. Through baptism "all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ" (Gal. 3:27) as St. Paul says. As the Maronite priest says during baptism to the newly baptized, "You are clothed in the Living Father, you receive the Son, the Christ, and you are wrapped in the Holy Spirit; you receive the robe of glory that Adam had taken off." Adam brought death into the world by his sin and ignoring of God, Who is Life. But when one accepts baptism, whether an infant or an elderly person, one receives God Himself into his or her person.

It might sound a bit strange that new life comes through this death of baptism. However, we die in baptism only in the sense that we are separating ourselves from the passing things of this world. It is not truly a death – as living a fleeting life is not truly living at all. But by casting off this fleeting life, we can accept eternal life from Jesus Christ by being born again by baptism, which He revealed Himself on the Jordan. And baptism is not simply a ritual of water but, just as His baptism revealed when the Holy Spirit descended in the form of a dove, it is also endowed with the Spirit. In the beginning of creation, as Genesis describes, the Holy Spirit hovered over the waters during the making of all things. The Holy Spirit once again hovers over the waters of baptism, and makes the baptized His permanent dwelling, recreating them anew.

It is by this new birth that we become spiritual children of the Father, and brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ. But baptism is only the beginning of our spiritual lives. As the priest calls baptism in our rite, it is the "clothing of righteousness," "the heavenly robe," "the shield of faith against the arrows of the Evil One" and "the armor of salvation." Baptism is not the end of our journey but the equipment. Having received the new life of baptism, whether as children or adults, we are called to the feast of heaven. To get there, we must follow the path of righteousness which Christ Himself walked before us to instruct us in His way, just as He gave us the example of His baptism. Following Him will lead us to the Kingdom of God.


