



### **Reflection** Feast of the Holy Cross In 12:20-32

Each year we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Cross on September 14. Not only do we have a feast for the Holy Cross, but the entire season from the Feast until the beginning of the new Church year (usually the first Sunday of November) is devoted to it. The cross is a central Christian symbol, but why do we Syriacs give it a feast and an entire season?


St. Helen, the mother of Emperor Constantine, built many churches in honor of our Lord in many important locations, spanning from Rome to Jerusalem. One of churches she built in Jerusalem is known as the Holy Sepulcher, which includes many important sites under one roof such as where Christ was crucified, died, was buried and rose from the grave. In the same spot she had also found the cross of our Lord. The feast, September 14, marks the consecration of the Holy Sepulcher, where the cross was found, in the year 335.

We venerate the cross, not as a historical object used to crucify Christ, but as the symbol that summarizes His entire worldly and heavenly actions towards us. The abundance of His mercies are innumerable and inexpressible, so He has given us a symbol to incapsulate all of them. The cross mystically represents everything He has done and continues to do on our behalf. As our prayers for the feast say, "The cross is the key to the door of paradise. The cross is the tree planted in the garden of joys." The cross was both the instrument Jesus chose to redeem us and the instrument He has given us to continue nourishing us spiritually. He sanctified and redeemed us from sin, which Adam's sin brought into the world, by His cross in His passion. But the cross was not used once only to become irrelevant, but after His life-giving passion, He gives us the same instrument in our own lives.

The cross is encapsulates all of Christ's saving dispensation on our behalf. As such He gives it to the priests of the Church to perfect the Mysteries [i.e. the sacraments]: "O you wood of the cross, how many mysteries are found in you! By your mark all the Mysteries of the Holy Church are performed. Without your holy power, none of them [i.e. the Mysteries] come to completion." Priests do not perfect the Mysteries by their own power, but by the power that has saved us and continues to save us – the power of Jesus Christ. In each Mystery, the priest makes the sign of the cross because each Mystery draws on the power of the sacrifice of Christ.

The same power of the cross is made available to us. As the prayers of the feast say, "By it [i.e. the cross] we ascend to heaven and by it we are protected in every hour for it has been made for us a refuge day and night." Each time we draw the sign of the cross upon ourselves, we not only remember the sacrifice of Christ, but we access the power of it. It protects us from harm and sanctifies us in our endeavors; it strengthens us and arms us against spiritual foes. The power of God – beyond comprehensible, expression or summary – is at our disposable simply by tracing it upon ourselves. All we need to do is make the sign of the cross in faith. It is a testament to God's immense love and mercy towards us – both in that He has saved us and continues to avail His cross to us. For this, we not only celebrate the Holy Cross, but sign ourselves and the Mysteries with it each and every day. May the cross be our refuge and protection!
