

COVID MASS POLICIES

- You will need to come with a mask. Mask may be removed to receive Communion obviously. We don't have masks to give you so please bring one.
- I cannot give Communion outside of Mass this means in your cars, on the sidewalk, etc. Communion for the homebound is suppressed also at this time.
- Sit only in spot marked on pews. Remain physically distant as you enter and exit the church through the basement entrance only.
- No lingering after Mass, you will need to leave directly.
- If your name is not of the sign up list the ushers cannot allow you to come in. We will need to be strict about this and apologize in advance for problems that might arise.
- I request you only use the downstairs entrance, below the main stairs, the other doors will be closed, this will help us to be able to clean commonly touched surfaces.
- We will not allow use of missals, or other books in the pews. Do your best with the responses.
- Only people who are members of the parish are eligible at this point to attend our limited Masses. If you have been coming regularly, and are not registered elsewhere but have not registered with us, now is the time to do this. Archbishop has asked that we keep people going to the parishes they are registered as a way to respect fair and equitable access to all.

Reflection

If we died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him (Romans 6:8).

This Sunday brings us to the third and final week of commemorations of the dead – the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. We continue to pray that God have mercy upon the departed this week, specifically focusing on the average faithful who have died, such as our friends, siblings, parents, and grandparents. It pays to ask, though, what were they faithful to and what is the result if they are dead? Jesus Christ answers this, saying, "I am the resurrection and the

life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die" (John 11:25-26).

We implore the Lord this Sunday that He have mercy and grant rest to those who have "eaten Your body, drank Your blood and have fallen asleep in Your hope" – the hope of the eternal life that Christ promises. And Christ will certainly grant eternal life to those who were faithful to Him, as He Himself is life. He is the Lord of life Who created life in the beginning, and has willed to destroy death by His becoming man. As St. Paul said, "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:57). Jesus Christ, Who is our immortal God and source of all life, united His divine life to our human mortality by becoming man that by dying He might destroy death. He joined His immortality to our mortality by becoming man, that death may not kill us if we cling to Him. By His dying, He – Life Himself, over Whom death has no power – went down to death to destroy it for those who follow Him. When Christ rose, He foreshadowed the life He offered to those who will also overcome death with Him at the end of time.

The resurrection of the dead is truly a real event. As a hymn verse from this Sunday recounts, Christ indicated the mystery of the resurrection multiple times throughout His life on earth:

Through three dead persons Christ revealed to us the mystery of the Resurrection. In three places of His journey He made death without threat: the daughter of Jairus in the house (Luke 8:49-56), the boy in the middle of the road (Luke 7:11-17) and Lazarus from the grave (John 11:1-44). Behold, in it were lain milestones of peace from beginning to end. (Trans. from the Commemoration of the Faith Departed)

In these various situations worth reading and recounting, Christ restores to life those who died with faith to foreshadow the resurrection. Each reveal a lot about the resurrection. When Jairus, for instance, asks Jesus to help his sick daughter who died, He responds, "She is not dead but asleep" (Luke 8:52) and the crowd responded by laughing at Jesus for they knew she was dead. In the cleverness of this world, the crowd thought the girl was lost for good, but Jesus Christ, Who is the Lord of the living and the dead, knows that to whom He grants the resurrection death is only like a nap. That is why we say the faithful departed "sleep" in Christ's hope – for when the resurrection occurs at the end of time, their death will only have been like a nap and they will live again. Likewise, we call them faithful "departed" (unlike those who go to hell, who are eternally "lost") because they will one day return to life just as Christ did.

This Sunday let us implore the Lord to grant the faithful departed rest in His Kingdom, and the resurrection into new eternal life:

O Lord, our Lord, Who delivered Yourself to the cross and tasted death for our salvation, raise and give life to the departed buried in Sheol for the sign of Your Lordship (i.e. baptism) is upon them, hallelujah! Through You may they have spiritual wings and enter with You into the bridal chamber of joys.

Dear Monsignors/Fathers,

I hope that my letter finds you enjoying the best of health and success in your parishes.

As we approach the Holy season of Lent, I wanted to address the observance of Ash Monday in the time of the COVID-19 pandemic and to thank you for all you have been doing to stay connected with your parishioners.

All parish priests are to bless and distribute ashes on Ash Monday during the celebration of the Divine Liturgy, except in parishes where local civil authorities have banned inperson Religious Services. The distribution of Ashes will follow the normal practice, with "Q tips" being used to mark each parishioner on the forehead with the sign of the Cross. Discard the Q tip after each use, but the same Q tip may be used for a family that lives together in the same household.

Ash Monday is a day of fasting. Fasting in the Maronite Church involves eating and drinking nothing at all (except water and medicine) from midnight until noon. The rest of the day normal meals can be taken, but without meat. All Maronites who are physically capable are to fast on Ash Monday. All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat and meat products. However, I urge you to emphasize to the parishioners the importance of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy during Lent.

Again, I wish to thank you for all you continue to do under very difficult circumstances and to assure you that I am keeping each of you in my prayers.
