

COVID MASS POLICIES

- You will need to come with a mask. Mask may be removed to receive Communion obviously. We don't have masks to give you so please bring one.
- I cannot give Communion outside of Mass this means in your cars, on the sidewalk, etc. Communion for the homebound is suppressed also at this time.
- Sit only in spot marked on pews. Remain physically distant as you enter and exit the church through the basement entrance only.
- No lingering after Mass, you will need to leave directly.
- If your name is not of the sign up list the ushers cannot allow you to come in. We will need to be strict about this and apologize in advance for problems that might arise.
- I request you only use the downstairs entrance, below the main stairs, the other doors will be closed, this will help us to be able to clean commonly touched surfaces.
- We will not allow use of missals, or other books in the pews. Do your best with the responses.
- Only people who are members of the parish are eligible at this point to attend our limited Masses. If you have been coming regularly, and are not registered elsewhere but have not registered with us, now is the time to do this. Archbishop has asked that we keep people going to the parishes they are registered as a way to respect fair and equitable access to all.

Reflection

"Do you love me?" is a question that can evoke many different feelings from its recipient, especially after a fight. In today's Gospel, Peter is eating with our Lord after seeing Him for the first time after Peter denied Him three times before His Crucifixion. One can only imagine the tension Peter held in his heart for his betrayal – when His Lord and beloved friend needed him most, he not only ran away but denied him. Then our Lord asked Peter, "Do you love me?" The Gospel tells us that Peter was hurt after Christ asked a third time, but perhaps Peter was hurt from the first time he was asked because of His own denial of the Lord three times. But Christ does not ask Peter "Do you love me?" in condemnation, but in negation for his previous rejection of Christ. In God's mercy, for every denial against Him He invites Peter back to Him!

God's mercy is wider than the sea, which is why He asks Peter the question "Do you love me?" for every time he denied the Lord. As Christ said earlier in the Gospel, "If you love me, you will keep my commands" (John 14:15). As the Lord of Mercy, Christ came to forgive our sins and so always gives us renewed opportunity to be forgiven. "Perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment" (1 John 4:18). It is God Who always initiates with us, even when we do not realize, but responding to the Lord with love, Peter is restored in his relationship with Jesus. Likewise, no offense of ours is too great for the Lord of Mercy – we must respond in contrition and love towards the Lord at His constant invitation to return to His love by denouncing our sin instead of denouncing Him.

When Peter responds three times that he does love the Lord, Christ restores him to a trusted place in the mission of the Church. As one of the diaconal proclamations during the Ordination Rite proclaims:

The Lord gave His sheep to Peter's care for he obeyed; He made him a shepherd for He saw he loved Him.


Christ had asked him if he loved Him to feed His lambs;

He knew Peter's love for Him was much so He gave much.

Love does indeed drive out fear and the fear of punishment, and "God is love" (1 John 4:8). When we separate ourselves from God, we delve into fear itself. And shortcomings are inevitable because we are imperfect people. But when we turn back to the Lord and seek to reunite with Him, we are restored just as Peter. But in desiring to be united to the love of the Lord, Peter was asked to be a light to the world (Matt. 5:14), and see that others are brought to the true faith and the eternal life of the Resurrection. Peter's love of God was not to be a "personal matter," but required him to change the very nature of his life. Because Peter loved the Lord, the Lord asked him to shepherd other lambs to the True Shepherd's sheepfold, the Church.

How shall we then respond to the Lord's constant inviting question "Do you love me?"
